WHAT IS IN THIS APPLICATION?

For bermuda & zoysia: heavy rates of potash, broadleaf weed control, and pre-emergents for winter grassy weeds. The potash promotes carbohydrate reserves to help your grass survive winter.

For fescue: balanced fertilizer and broadleaf weed control.

For newly-seeded or overseeded fescue grass: balanced rates of granular fertilizer to promote healthy germination.

WHAT IF IT RAINS?

Then you don't have to water it in! Rain only affects weed control, not fertility. We ask that you wait 14-21 days before judging the results, (curling & twisting of weeds), then call us if you still see a problem. For optimal results, **please water after 48 hours**, in the absence of rain.

ISTHEREANYTHINGICANDONOWTOPROTECTMY LAWN FROM WINTER/COLD WEATHER DAMAGE?

Lawns that didn't receive enough water in late summer, or areas of thinning bermuda are especially susceptible to winter damage. But taking the following steps can minimize effects of winter damage.

- Mow your bermuda high this time of year, and DO NOT scalp it. Leaving it long will help insulate it against cold winter temperatures.
- Keep the lawn watered when possible during winter, to keep the root system alive and to provide extra insulation.
- On bermuda lawns, mow over your leaves to mulch them and leave them on the lawn to provide extra insulation. (DOES NOT apply to fescue lawns.)

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FESCUE LAWNS

Fescue lawns that have been overseeded need special care at this time of year. New seedlings must be kept moist until they are 2 inches tall – a light watering twice per day is sufficient, although bear in mind that high winds will dry out your lawn more quickly. After it's 2 inches tall, you may resume a regular twice weekly deep watering.



Keep the leaves up off your fescue as much as possible. This is the time of year when fescue makes food for itself by the process of photosynthesis by absorbing sunlight. It needs to store up carbohydrates to survive through our hot summer next year, and this is the time it gets the most sunlight, since the leaves are coming off the trees. If fescue is covered by leaves, it cannot get the sunlight it needs.



While the new seedlings are small and you are keeping them moist, don't use a rake on the grass or you will pull out the seedlings. Blow the leaves off, or carefully use a lawn vacuum.

WINTER WEATHER

Bear in mind that if you use salt on your driveway to melt ice or snow, you don't want to shovel it off onto your grass, or you may damage the grass. Even if you don't use salt, shoveling snow into large piles and letting them sit there for weeks isn't good for your grass, either. Piles of snow, freezing and thawing repeatedly, can cause winter damage to your grass.
